In the Field

Regularly scheduled birding field trips will resume this month! We'll kick off with a full-day trip in the Everglades Agricultural Area south of Lake Okeechobee in Palm Beach County where flooded fields tend to attract large numbers of wading birds including Roseate Spoonbills (pictured) and migrant shorebirds, including American Avocet, Pectoral and Stilt Sandpiper and Wilson's Phalarope. Our second trip of the month will be to Greynolds Park where we'll look for Eastern Screech-owls and other species. To view our Fall 2022 trip schedule visit our website calendar. Volunteers Needed for Bird Collision Data Collection



Fall bird migration is at its peak this month and into early November as millions of birds heading south for the winter pass through South Florida. Because migrating birds generally rest and forage during the day and travel at night using the stars as navigational aids, brightly lit cities impede their night vision, steer them off course, and can confuse and disorient them, often causing deadly collisions. Sadly, millions of birds are lost to building collisions in the U.S. each year.

To lower the mortality rate, Tropical Audubon Society's *Light's Out Miami* initiative urges homeowners and building managers to turn off or block non-essential lights from 11 p.m. to 6 a.m. through November 15 to protect migratory birds traveling through our region.

Bird Collision Data Collection volunteers are urgently needed to search for birds who have been injured or killed by colliding with buildings. Data collected anywhere in Miami-Dade County is of value, but most needed are volunteers who are able to monitor the Brickell, Downtown and Biscayne Boulevard corridor, as well as areas such as Aventura, Coconut Grove and Coral Gables business districts, Downtown Dadeland, Miami Beach and any other communities with a concentration of tall buildings where collisions are highly likely.

Fall Migration Fundraiser to benefit Cape Florida Banding Station field work

TAS & Partners file Lawsuit to Protect Critical Habitat for Florida Bonneted Bat



On July 6, 2022, the Center for Biological Diversity, the Miami Blue Chapter of the North American Butterfly Association and Tropical Audubon Society sued the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to push the agency to protect endangered Florida bonneted bats by designating lifesaving critical habitat. The Bonneted bat faces devastating habitat loss from urban sprawl and sea-level rise.

Pesticide use and development nearly drove the species to extinction. The species finally received endangered status under the Endangered Species Act in 2013, thanks largely to the Center for Biological Diversity's litigation.

Subsequently, Center for Biological Diversity, the Miami Blue Chapter of the North American Butterfly Association and Tropical Audubon Society <u>sued</u> in 2018 to compel the Service to propose critical habitat, but the Service still has not published a final critical habitat determination.
