September in the Field

Fall migration shifts into high gear this month as more and more songbirds seek stopover habitat in the Miami area to rest and refuel during their perilous journey south to their wintering grounds. Birders should keep a close eye on the weather, because a combination of overnight rains and westerly winds sometimes create fallout conditions, whereby dozens, or even hundreds, of migrant birds can suddenly appear in every tree and shrub. Fall Migration Season Takes Flight at Cape Florida Banding Station



The Fall Migration season is off to a busy start at the Cape Florida Banding Station!

Volunteers, under the direction of master banders, have banded 118 birds representing 17 species since August 15. The first documented visitor was a male American Redstart, a colorful wood warbler and early Fall migrant. The station also recently received a rare visitor — a Canada Warbler!
